AMERICAN MIDWIFERY CERTIFICATION BOARD 2023 Annual Report



Background

The mission of the American Midwifery Certification Board (AMCB) is to protect and serve the public by leading the certification standards in midwifery. The AMCB fulfills this mission through three primary activities: developing and administering a validated certification exam to assess the entry-level competencies of nurse-midwives (CNM) and midwives (CM); requiring a mandatory certificate maintenance and re-certification program for all AMCB certified CNM/CMs, and maintaining professional discipline.


Since 2002, the AMCB has been accredited through The National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA). Compliance with the NCCA Standards for the Accreditation of Certification Programs mandates that NCCA accredited organizations adhere to modern standards of practice in the certification industry. Both the Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) and Certified Midwife (CM) certification programs are accredited by NCCA through 12/31/2026.

Recertification

From 2015 to 2020, the annual number of midwives choosing to retire ranged from 1.7% to 2.4%. This number began to rise in 2021 to 3% and again in 2022 to its highest point of 4.2%. There was a slight decrease to 3.9% in 2023 (See Table 1 and Figure 1). These nominal fluctuations are expected as the workforce ages.

*Beginning in 2011 all certificants were required to begin recertifying. Before this, anyone certified prior to 1996 did not have to meet recertification requirements.




New Certification

The national certification exam (NCE) has been administered via computer-based testing (CBT) since 2005. AMCB's testing partner; PSI Services, offers testing 52 weeks of the year, 5 days each week and at least one Saturday per month in all 50 states within the U.S. Candidates for certification are able to take the examination at their convenience at any of PSI's 300 plus testing sites as soon as their application is approved. Candidates receive official pass/fail results at the conclusion of their examination. AMCB then issues a formal certificate as well as wallet-sized certification card for ease in documenting current certification.

In 2023, the increase in the number of newly certified CMN/CMs was 8.2%, a small decrease from 8.3% in 2022 (see Table 2, Figure 2). Following increases of 15.7% in 2021 and 8.3% in 2022, this decrease may represent a more stabilized post COVID-19 health care workforce. As more and more new midwifery programs are opened across the U.S, upward trends are likely to follow over the next few years to meet the rising demands for competent, well-trained midwives. Exam Pass/Fail Rates

As required by NCCA in 2015, pass/fail statistics are now included in the AMCB Annual Report. As reported below in Table 3, the overall pass rate for all exam attempts in 2023 was 79.7%, nominally decreased from 81.3% in 2022. This data does not differentiate first time versus repeat test attempts (which can lower the over all pass rates). In 2021, for example the first-time pass rate was 84.7% with a repeat pass rate of 64%. Likewise in 2022, the first-time pass rate was 83% and repeat pass rate was 72.2%, a notable rise from previous years. Several midwifery programs continue to have 100% first-time pass rates: 13 in 2020, 5 in 2021, 8 in 2022, and 7 in 2023.

Activities and Updates

- -2023 was a productive year for AMCB as the Board, CEO, and staff maintained the standards of excellence and carried on the important work of the organization. Noteworthy accomplishments included:
- -A DEIB web page is now available and AMCB staff, Board, and committee members have continued this important personal and organizational anti-racism work. In addition, several board members have participated the ASAE DEIA and Conscious Inclusion Micro Credential Program.
- -Plans were finalized for The Transition to Professional Midwifery Practice program with a January 2024 start date.
- -The research committee led by Chair Dr. Brie Thumm, completed their workforce study: AMCB Certification Demographic and Employment Data, 2016 to 2020: the Certified Nurse-Midwife and Certified Midwife Workforce. This important research was published in the *Journal of Midwifery & Women's Health* in October/November 2023 and is available on the AMCB website.

Board Member Changes

2023 marked the end of the terms for AMCB Secretary Erin McMahon, EdD, CNM, RN MSN and Professional Liaison Rick Garcia, PhD, RN, CCM, FAAOHN. The AMCB secretary position has been filled by Elle Schnetzler, DM, CM, FACNM which created an opening on the Board for the Chair of the Credentials, Administration & Reporting Committee. This vacancy has been filled by Mary Barger, CNM, PhD, MPH, FACNM and the Professional Liaison opening has been filled by Suzanne Staebler, DNP, NNP-BC, FAANP, FAAN for 2024.

We would like to welcome Mary and Suzanne to our BOD. We would also like to thank Erin and Rick for their dedicated service to AMCB and acknowledge their significant contributions over the past 6 years.

Specific President and CEO Activities

In 2023, The AMCB staff, CEO and myself attended the ACNM Annual Meeting in Orlando. In addition, AMCB was a platinum sponsor for this event. The meeting was productive and we attended several key events and meetings including DOME, ACNM Presidents reception, and a networking meeting regarding the future of USMERA.

AMCB Certification Manager, Rebecca Koskovich accompanied us to the DOME meeting to directly address program directors' questions and concerns. Although feedback from DOME regarding this face-to-face meeting was positive, it was decided at the last AMCB Board meeting to discontinue in-person attendance at future DOME meetings. As such, DOME was notified all future communication with AMCB will be in writing. We have since received written communication from DOME with several questions that will be discussed at the Spring 2024 BOD meeting.

We attended ACNM business meetings via zoom and participated in several brainstorming meetings with ACNM, ACME, and the ACNM Foundation. At the November AMCB Board meeting the Transition to Professional Midwifery Practice was approved. It is our hope that this program will help boost membership in ACNM moving forward. We will continue to keep these lines of communication open.

Summary

2023 has brought continued success to AMCB. In-person meetings at the new office were productive, lively, and welcome gatherings. We welcomed 740 newly certified midwives into the workforce in 2023, bringing the total CNM/CMs to 14,196. As more midwifery programs become accredited, it is anticipated this trend will continue to meet the growing need for competent, well-trained midwives.

While we have much to celebrate this year, there is always ongoing work to be done and AMCB is well positioned to face any challenges that may arise in the coming year. We have had the good fortune of stable and dedicated leadership and staff with ongoing financial stability. I am grateful for the volunteer service of our board and committee members and proud to serve as your president.
