

AMERICAN MIDWIFERY CERTIFICATION BOARD 2025 Annual Report



Background

The mission of the American Midwifery Certification Board (AMCB) is to protect and serve the public by leading the certification standards in midwifery. The AMCB fulfills this mission through three primary activities: developing and administering a validated certification exam to assess the entry-level competencies of nurse-midwives (CNM) and midwives (CM); requiring a mandatory certificate maintenance and re-certification program for all AMCB certified CNM/CMs and maintaining professional discipline.

Since 2002, the AMCB has been accredited through The National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA). Compliance with the NCCA Standards for the Accreditation of Certification Programs mandates that NCCA accredited organizations adhere to modern standards of practice in the certification industry. Both the Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) and Certified Midwife (CM) certification programs are accredited by NCCA through 12/31/2026.

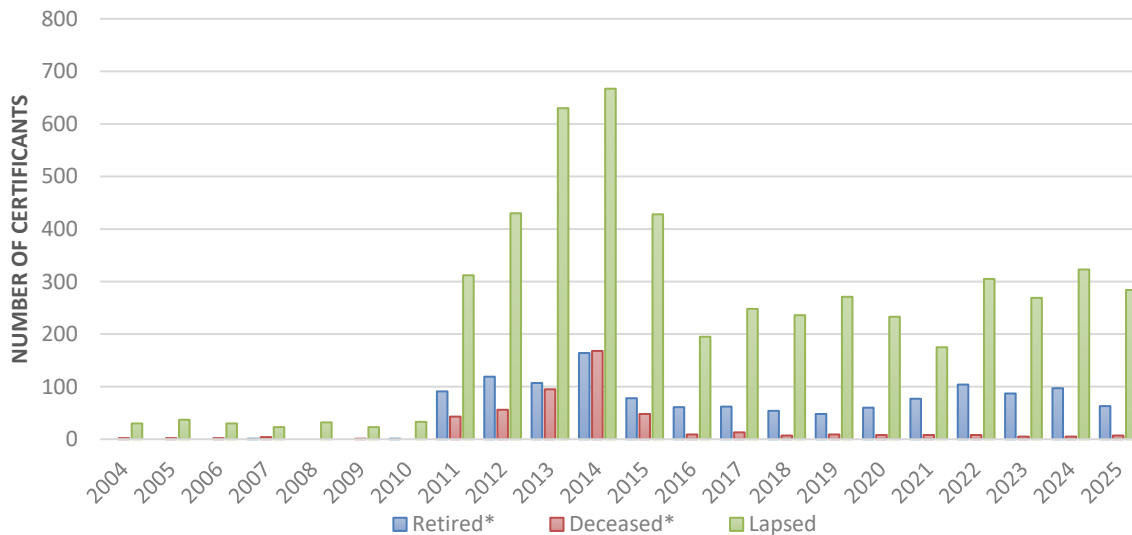
Recertification

From 2015 to 2020, the annual number of midwives choosing to retire ranged from 1.7% to 2.4%. This number began to rise in 2021 to 3% and again in 2022 to its highest point of 4.2%. There was a slight decrease to 3.9% in 2023, 3.5% in 2024, and 1.8% in 2025. (See Table 1 and Figure 1). These nominal fluctuations are expected as the workforce ages.

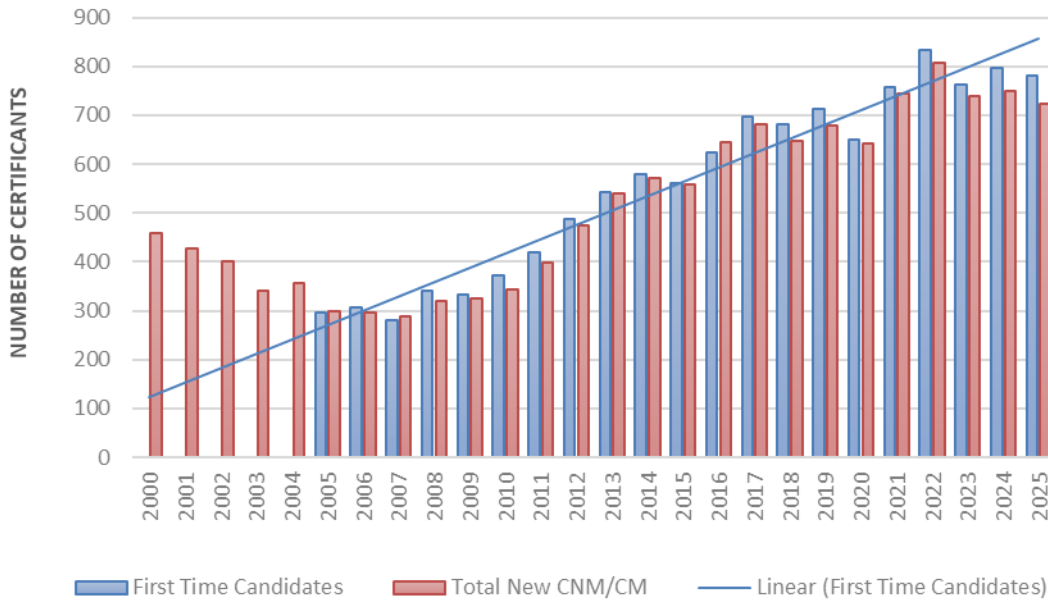
New Certification

The national certification exam (NCE) has been administered via computer-based testing (CBT) since 2005. AMCB’s testing partner; PSI Services, offers testing 52 weeks of the year, 5 days each week and at least one Saturday per month in all 50 states within the U.S. Candidates for certification are able to take the examination at their convenience at any of PSI’s 260 plus testing sites as soon as their application is approved. Candidates receive official pass/fail results at the conclusion of their examination. AMCB then issues a formal certificate as well as wallet-sized certification card for ease in documenting current certification.

As more and more new midwifery programs are opened across the U.S, upward trends are likely to follow over the next few years to meet the rising demands for competent, well-trained midwives. Additional details by state can be found at: <https://www.amcbmidwife.org/about-amcb/research-reports>.

Exam Pass/Fail Rates

As required by NCCA in 2015, pass/fail statistics are now included in the AMCB Annual Report. As reported below in Table 3, the overall pass rate for all exam attempts in 2025 was 69.8%, decreased from 73.0% in 2024. This data does not differentiate first time versus repeat test attempts (which can lower the overall pass rates). In 2023 for example, the first-time pass rate was 84% with a repeat pass rate of 59%. Likewise in 2024, the first-time pass rate was 79.7% and repeat pass rate was 50.6% and in 2025 the first-time pass rate was 74.5% and the repeat pass rate was 55.5%.

Activities and Updates

2025 was another productive year for AMCB. The Board, CEO, and staff maintained the standards of excellence and carried on the important work of the organization. Continued accomplishments include:

- The Transition to Professional Midwifery Practice program which began in 2024, offered 1036 certificants the ability to automatically be entered into a drawing for a free two-year ACNM membership (AMCB pays the membership fees to ACNM directly). In 2025 there were 146 National and Affiliate memberships given away. This equals 20% of the total new AMCB certificants that received a free 2-year ACNM membership.

The AMCB President and CEO plan to attend the ASAE Exceptional Boards: Strengthening the Governance Team for our high performing Board and work on strategic planning for the next year to improve your certification experience. The Board and CEO continue to uphold the values of Integrity, Accountability, and Respect.

Board Member Changes

In 2025, I completed my first year as the President. In November 2025, we also approved the election of new board members: Traci Burgess, MD, MPH, CPE as our Professional Liaison and Tiwaladeoluwa B. Adekunle, PhD, MA as the Consumer Member. We want to thank Dr. Dominique Delma, MD and Clarissa Huard, MPH, CLC for their years of service to AMCB.

Specific President and CEO Activities

In 2025, the CEO and myself attended in-person AMCB Spring and Fall Board of Director Meetings, ACNM business and board meetings via zoom and participated in several brainstorming meetings with ACNM, meetings with members of ACNM committees, and LACE monthly meetings. I attended the 2025 ACNM Annual Meeting & Exhibit.

We will continue to keep lines of communication open with other midwifery organizations. I also oversaw discipline case reviews and meetings.

The CEO completed a 20-year History Document for the Board chronicling how and why AMCB needed to become a separate credentialing entity, and the ongoing midwifery support offered since AMCB's inception.

Summary

Our continued success at AMCB is led by our mission statement and values. We thanked past board members for their years of service and welcomed new board members. We welcomed 723 newly certified midwives into the workforce in 2025, bringing the total CNM/CMs to 14,832. As more midwifery programs become accredited, it is anticipated this trend will continue to meet the growing need for competent, well-trained midwives.

As we celebrate the close of 2025, there is still much work to be completed, relationships to strengthen and support to be offered. AMCB is well positioned with excellent dedicated leadership and staff to support this ongoing work. I am grateful for the volunteer service of our board and committee members and proud to complete my first year as your president.
